
QUOTATION OF THE MONTH

We provide free consultation on ethical issues related to research design, tissue banking, genetic research results, informed consent, and working with vulnerable patient populations. In particular, we assist clinical investigators in identifying and addressing the ethical challenges that frequently arise when designing or conducting research with human subjects. These include ethical challenges in sampling design; randomized and placebo-controlled studies; participant recruitment and informed consent; return of individual-level research results; community engagement processes; and more. PUBLICATION HIGHLIGHT

Navigating the Choppy Waters Between Public Safety and Humane Care of the Prisoner-Patient: The Role of the Ethics Consultant

The July issue of the American Journal of Bioethics explored what just health care might entail when caring for a hospitalized prisoner who is dying shackled to the bed with imposed restrictions on family contact. Dr. Anita Tarzian at the University of Maryland provided the case, which is accessible here. There were three commentaries based on the case. One was written by Dr. Laurel Lyckholm, faculty member in the Program in Bioethics and Humanities and oncologist, and Laura Shinkunas, research specialist in the Program. In their commentary, Dr. Lyckholm and Ms. Shinkunas point out the inherent tension the case of the "prisoner-patient" brings out (i.e., balancing staff and public safety with the duty to provide compassionate end-of-life care). They present ethical considerations to inform whether shackles and restricted visitation are justified in this case, and how the health care ethics consultants' code of ethics may apply.


